On May 31st, 1957, then president of CNP Coal, W.R. Wilson, announced that the mines at Coal Creek would be closed. Above ground, a wildfire that consumed part of the settlement that year and forced its evacuation foretold the community's ultimate fate.

As you follow the trail through the Coal Creek Townsite, and old mining ruins, reflect on what life would have been like here 100 years ago.

Coal Creek Heritage Trail Townsite Loop

You are beginning your adventure at the Townsite Trailhead Kiosk parking area. The trail is evident to your left when facing north, and is marked by a yellow metal sign on a tree. After passing some old stone foundations, you will enter into a large clearing, where you will continue through this area and come to one of the old mine portal areas. The smell of sulphur will be evident here as the old mine seeps water from the depths. Further along the trail ascends to your right, into "Slav Town" an area where some of the workers lived, 300 m. later the loop trail departs to the right where a steep track follows along a mossy creek. If water is flowing in the creek, a small waterfall splashes down from the cliffs above. You will arrive at a view point, where expansive views of the Coal Creek Valley can be enjoyed. The route descends on
