REGIONAL SNAPSHOT | MARCH 26, 2020

LOCAL UPDATES

- The Regional District, municipalities and First Nations communities in the region continue to coordinate and communicate through the Regional Emergency Operations Centre so that we can work collectively as a region, share information, share resources, discuss challenges and identify solutions.
- We are also working with other key stakeholders like the School Districts, Emergency Services, Emergency Management BC and Interior Health to provide support and coordination as required.

NEW PROVINCIAL UPDATES

- The Province today announced that it was enacting extraordinary measures under the Emergency Program Act to support the Province's response to COVID-19 and ensure a coordinated response across all local governments in BC. These include (but are not limited to):
 - establishing a Provincial Supply Chain Coordination Unit to coordinate the distribution of essential goods and services.
 - Banning the resale of food, medical supplies, personal protective equipment, cleaning and other essential supplies.
 - Restricting quantities of items purchased at point of sale.
 - Suspending all local states of emergency in BC, except for the City of Vancouver (there are none in the East Kootenay).
 - Making it easier for vulnerable to access critical services like food banks and shelters
- The Province also updated the list of essential services in BC to provide more clarity around a wide range of services covering everything from health and law enforcement to food/agriculture, critical infrastructure, sanitation, transportation and more.
- MSP coverage expands to temporary foreign workers until July 31.
- The Province is expanding the bc211 line to match seniors whose support network has been affected by COVID-19 with volunteers.
- The 211 service will take calls from people who would like to volunteer to help seniors in their community with basic needs, including grocery shopping and pharmacy drop-offs and checkins. They will then share it with local community agencies to match seniors and volunteers who live in the same community.

MORE NEW PROVINCIAL UPDATES

- The Province has announced new clinical guidance for prescribers, pharmacists and care teams to help at-risk populations and support people who have a history of substance abuse.
- Open Burning has been prohibited in all High Smoke Sensitivity Zones in BC until Wednesday, April 15 - including most of the Elk Valley and Columbia Valley, a pocket in Jaffray area, and a large area across Moyie/Cranbrook/Kimberley. This is to protect the air quality as air pollution can impact people's susceptibility to infection.

PHYSICAL DISTANCING:

Now is the time we can make a difference. Physical distancing is our greatest weapon and defense.

- Keep 6 feet (2m) between you and others (it's like the length of a hockey stick)
- <u>Stay home</u> cancel play/coffee dates, group visits
- Stay where you are absolutely <u>no</u>
 non-essential travel within your community or
 between communities.

NEW FEDERAL UPDATES

- The Federal Government is working to get the new Health Portal online for the Canada Emergency Response Benefit and once online, applicants should receive payment within 14 days of applying.
- The Canada Child Benefit is getting boosted in May.
- A new text scam started today in parts of Canada use www.canada.ca to get information on the new Emergency Response Benefit, not a text message.
- The Federal Government has ordered stocks of supplies from domestic and international suppliers to meet the needs across the country.
- Over 158,000 people have been tested across Canada, including 58,000 since Monday.
- The penalties for disobeying the Quarantine Act for travellers returning to Canada were detailed today (see box at right).

As of March 25, all persons entering Canada <u>must</u> <u>quarantine</u> themselves for 14 days.

Under the Federal
Quarantine Act, anyone
who fails to comply faces
maximum penalties of a
fine of up to \$750,000 and/
or imprisonment for six
months.

Those found to be reckless and who've jeopardized someone's life, face a penalty of up to 1,000,000 and/or 3 years prison.
