APRIL 21, 2020

NEW PROVINCIAL UPDATES

- A reminder that any BC resident who was at Kearl Lake project, near Fort McMurray, Alta., from March onward is ordered by the provincial health officer to immediately self-isolate for 14 days and contact your primary care provider, 811 or local public health team.
- An outbreak has been identified at the United Poultry Company in the Vancouver Coastal Health region. To date, 28 employees have been confirmed positive through active contact tracing by public heath. Close contacts have been notified and ordered to self-isolate. The plant has been closed to slow further transmission, and public health teams are providing support.
- Dr. Henry and Minister Dix again emphasized that we are at an important crossroads in BC with our COVID-19 response. Every day counts, and every action each of us takes makes a difference. While advanced planning is underway for the recovery phase, possibly starting as early as mid-May, the key priority remains on ensuring the transmission of the virus and new cases have lessened, so that everyone can return to work safely.
- Provincial emergency COVID-19 funding will be distributed through Community Living BC (CLBC) to ensure people with developmental disabilities stay supported and safe during the pandemic. As part of the \$5-billion COVID-19 Action Plan, up to \$35.6 million will be available over three months from CLBC to support service providers to continue delivering residential services, including group homes, home sharing and supported independent living that about 9,500 adults with developmental disabilities count on.

NEW FEDERAL UPDATES

- Today, the Federal government launched the Canada Emergency Wage Subsidy calculator to support employers as they prepare to apply for the CEWS, Canada Emergency Wage Subsidy (CEWS). It includes information and instructions about who can apply for the subsidy, how eligibility is assessed, and how the subsidy is calculated as well as a printable statement feature that employers can use to view their claim at a glance.
- Prime Minister Trudeau has announced an investment of \$350 million to support vulnerable Canadians through charities and non-profit organizations that deliver essential services to those in need. It will support a variety of activities, including: increasing volunteer-based home deliveries of groceries and medications, providing transportation services, like accompanying or driving seniors or persons with disabilities to appointments, providing additional training, supplies and supports to volunteers.

We have been receiving a number of calls and inquiries regarding golf courses and their operation during the pandemic.

While golf courses <u>are allowed</u> to open in BC, Interior Health has provided specific guidance related to changes in regular operations that are required in order for them to operate safely during COVID-19.

All businesses that are still operating are expected to:

- Limit the number of people using the golf course (including employees) to less than 50 people
- Exclude employees and customers who have travelled in the last 14 days
- Exclude employees and customers who are exhibiting any symptoms of COVID-19
- Not allow people to congregate in groups
- Maintain physical distancing
- Clean and sanitize common touched surfaces often (regularly throughout the day)
- Provide signage to remind people of the requirements, encourage good handwashing and respiratory hygiene
- Ensure washrooms remain available for use, are cleaned/sanitized a couple of times a day, and are well stocked

Further considerations for golf courses include:

- Keep playing groups at least one hole apart (i.e. reduce number of available tee times to decrease number of players on the course)
- Signage / posters on best practices (physical distancing, don't play if ill, use good hygiene practices wash hands, have extra hand sanitizer dispensers, practice respiratory hygiene, etc.)
- Regular disinfection of high touch surfaces e.g. disinfect carts after each use
- Do not allow shared carts
- Do not provide dine-in service (take-out & delivery only)
- Provide methods to ensure 2m separation in clubhouse at check-in prior to tee time. Limit numbers entering buildings and restrict other activities to ensure guests are moved through the facility promptly.
